

BIOMEDICAL SCIENCES (BC98) AT THE UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD: APPLICATION CHECKLIST

1. CHECK THE ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

2. ATTEND AN OPEN DAY

4. REGISTER FOR THE BMAT

All applicants to Biomedical Sciences at Oxford must register for and sit the BioMedical Admissions Test (BMAT).

UK candidates are able to sit the BMAT in their own school or college - and should contact their examinations' officer to register for the test. Candidates outside the UK should identify the open test centre closest to them; there are test centres worldwide, and a list is available at www.atsts.org.uk.

Candidates can register for the BMAT from 1 September; the standard entry closing date is midnight on 1 October, and there is a late entry closing date, 6pm on 15 October. Please note that if you register after 1 October you will incur a large penalty fee.

The BMAT will be sat everywhere in the world on 31 October.

5. CHOOSE A COLLEGE

You can choose a college if you want to, but you do not have to! All colleges are academically strong, and teaching provision (lectures, practicals, seminars, etc.) will be the same regardless of the college you are in.

The college to which a candidate applies has no bearing on their chances of gaining a place: the ratio of interviews to places is the same across all the colleges (so colleges with large numbers of places see more applicants at interview). Candidates should focus on the style and content of the programme we offer, not on unnecessary comparisons between colleges. Every applicant is interviewed at two colleges, helping to ensure that the strength of each college's cohort of applicants is very similar. In fact, because each applicant is interviewed by two colleges, around a third of the successful candidates are placed at a college other than the one they originally selected on their UCAS form.

If a candidate doesn't have a strong view about a particular college, we encourage them to make an 'open' application that allows us to assign them to a college based on the numbers of available places and the number of applications. This is designed to ensure that everyone has an equal opportunity to compete for the available places. However, if they have decided that one particular college appeals to them - perhaps because of its location or its facilities - then they should specify that college on application form.

6. SUBMIT AN APPLICATION THROUGH UCAS

The deadline for submission of UCAS applications is 15 October every year (see www.ucas.ac.uk). Applications submitted to UCAS past the 15 October deadline cannot be considered by Oxford.

Please ensure that you give your complete qualifications history, and not just details of the qualifications you might be currently working towards (i.e. provide full information on your GCSEs or GCSE-equivalent qualifications).
